Indoor soccer has just ended but it is already time to register for fall soccer. The Bel Air league of the FCA (Fellowship of Christian Athletes) team started their fall registration last week.

The fee this year for the FCA rec team will be \$85.

There has been MUCH interest in the FCA LADY STRIKERS team from players around the area. This interest has sparked some new oppurtunities for all of our players. We have formed a FCA SOCCER BOARD to help guide these new oppurtunities. We will have our SAME rec team this year AND there is a good possibility that FCA may be able to form a SECOND rec team in the BEL AIR REC LEAGUE. All efforts will be made to keep our original team from last year together.

IN ADDITION, we will be forming a VARSITY FCA LADY STRIKERS TEAM. We plan on playing an 8 game schedule against private area high schools. We have 4 games already scheduled for the fall. The goal is to transition into a permanent VARSITY team for the 2012 season. For the 2011 season, players wanting to tryout for the VARSITY team will be required to play for the rec team in addition to the Varsity team. Although we do not anticipate turning away any players wanting to play for the Varsity team, we will have tryouts and we will carry no more than 21 players for the first year.. The team fee for the Varsity team, which includes playing for the rec team, will be \$150. The Varsity team will have their own set of uniforms and some other team apparel.

Some quick guidelines for the two programs being offered:

REC TEAM:

- Players can be from any school or home school.
- Players up to the age of 19 ARE ELIGIBLE, which includes most girls in their freshmen year of college.
- Players may be in 8th grade as well.

VARSITY TEAM:

- Players must be in high school, 9th-12th grade.
- Players must be either home schooled or attend a school that DOES NOT offer girls soccer in the FALL.




BOOK REVIEWS BY SUZANNE SNIFFEN

If you have elected to receive our forum notifications, you have received some excellent book reviews by one of our parents, Suzanne Sniffen. Reviewing books for publishers is something she loves to do, but does not get paid for, so she is not trying to sell you anything. Here is here latest review:

READING THAT FEELS GOOD

Reading can either put a smile on your face--and on your heart--or make you feel like you wish hadn't read the book. Sometimes that feeling is just a twinge; sometimes it's a lot more than that. I remember once hearing that without sadness, we wouldn't be able to feel happiness. Perhaps, it is the same with books. I've read many books that have made me

cringe. So, when I read one that leaves me with a smile, it's a blessing.



When I began pondering books for reluctant readers recently, several friends suggested YWAM's Heroes series of books for kids. They have four series of books for children. I received a book from their Christian Heroes: Then and

Now series and **Heroes for Young Readers** series as well as the curriculum guide and activity guide for these books. These are the books that I get to review today and the book that put a smile in my heart.

I read the Heroes for Young Readers biography of Gladys Aylward by Renee Taft Meloche and Christian Heroes: Then & Now biography of Janet & Geoff Benge of Gladys Aylward.




As soon as the books arrived, my kids were eager to open them up, so I sat down on the couch and opened up the younger book with them. They sat and listened to the whole book. I cried at the end. Afterwards, I opened up the activity guide and we did the character activity for Gladys Aylward. We started by laying down on the ground. I read the script and we acted it out as I read. My children loved it. I looked through the Activity Guide and I was surprised and pleased. With one activity, I had concerns with the beginning but as I read on, I began to understand it and I liked the lesson the activity taught. The activity guides for the young reader books each cover 4 books. There are books on heroes from American history and missionaries. On Google Books, you can see a preview of the book for young readers, but not the activity guide.

Later that afternoon, I opened up the older novel and read the first two chapters. I was immediately struck that this book was interesting and had great description, though it was very easy to read. The vocabulary is about a 5th or 6th grade reading level. I'd say it would be great for students in grades 4-8. Over the next week, I read the book and the farther I got into it, the more I wanted to read it. It drew me in. It is a biography that is written in story form. When I reached the end, I was glad I had the entire book--every page of it.

But, when I read a book, I am usually thinking about it as more than just a simple story. I want my children to read books that are worth reading. So, I ponder what message this book would tell kids--what will they take from it? What did I take from it? Interestingly, I'm reading a book about evangelical feminism right now which really made me ponder her actions as a woman. I came to several conclusions.

- 1) I need to focus on the strengths of Gladys Aylward and what she did.
- 2) George Santayana said "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it." What can we learn from Gladys Aylward and her life? Hopefully, the reader will be able to see the Chinese as people and with compassion after reading this book.
- 3) When we make decisions, I have come to believe that we should seek God in prayer, in His Word, and seek out godly counsel (Proverbs 15:22). Psalms is filled with David crying out to God in prayer. That is the one thing that isn't mentioned in this book and what I struggled with. In the story, Gladys isn't encouraged by anyone to go to China. If anything, she is discouraged. What I realized is that this story is told from the authors' perspective--it is not an autobiography. I don't know if there was anyone who encouraged her to go, but there could have been. If you or your children have questions about book, do more research! Find another biography and see if you can find an answer to what you're questioning.



While reading the book, I perused the curriculum guide for that book. I was very impressed! I liked the comprehension questions for each chapter, the essay questions, creative writing topics, and activity suggestions. One thing that was interesting was when one of the essay questions suggested something that wasn't in the book. The question asked about dyslexia. It would explain a lot about her struggles in Bible school and I wish that the authors talked about it in the story, but they don't. They don't talk about it because it isn't certain, but I like how the question is written in the essay questions. They don't claim it is true, but instead encourage the student to examine how her life fits the profile of someone who has dyslexia and how it could affect her. On the curriculum guide, there is also information about the authors and the series of books. It is interesting and helpful to hear what their perspective is and how they've done their research.

My conclusion? I like the series. I would definitely recommend getting and using the curriculum guides with the novels. The activity guides also bring much more life and understanding to the younger books. There may be topics you want to discuss with your children that are covered in the books. I would recommend that you read them too. I think you'll probably enjoy them. I did. You could use them for multicultural studies, social studies, English, as Unit Studies, or as part of your Bible curriculum and discuss what it means to be a missionary. I do think it's also important to help your children understand that we can be missionaries write where we are and love the people in our communities. My plan is to read several of these books with my children when they are in grades 4-8 and contrast the lives of the missionaries with our own lives. As a culture, we have an idealized view of the past and expect there to be less suffering than there is. In the past, people expected life to be hard. It's reflected in their writings. These books don't idealize the past and will hopefully help our children that God didn't promise that life would be easy.

There is one last note that I want to make about these books. It is important not to see missionaries as saints. They were sinners too. They weren't perfect. God used them just as he uses all imperfect people. In the Bible, we see that over and over--God uses imperfect people. They spread the gospel as we are all called to do and they answered this command in a particular way.

If you are interested in getting any books from these series, you can see previews of them online at Google books. The best prices are on YWAM's website and they have specials this spring if you buy several books at once.

I know I have met some of you but not everyone. I wanted to give you all information about CC if you have not had a chance to attend an information meeting. Also I think a little differently about CC so it would benefit you to read my information email attached so you know my thoughts on Classical Conversations.

Classical Conversations is not a supplemental program but a whole curriculum that stands alone very well but you may supplement as your childrens interest and stages of learning progress. The only thing you really need to add to CC is a Math program and a Language Arts program. And if your have 3rd grade and up you can put them in the afternoon program and have your language arts covered as well. This is a great program that can help guide you through your homeschool years with your children. It can also save you money on curriculum because you use this for all your children and for all their elementary years.

I will keep you up-to-date on my information meetings as I schedule them.

I'm taking tutor applications and student registrations. Please email me if you need tutor requirements and an application. Please make checks payable to me. You need to send your registration and supply fee for each child to hold their place.

ATTACHMENTS HAVE BEEN OPENED AND ARE INCLUDED HERE

Our program is a classical Christian approach to homeschooling. Classical Conversations is a national program and we have a 12 communities in Maryland and are adding 5 this next year. Our Bel Air community will consists of our elementary program and we are hoping a Challenge director will step up so we can add a middle school program as well.

The lower level program is for student's ages 4 through 11-12 years olds. We call this program Foundations. The middle and upper levels are called Challenge and are for students 12 and up. The age ranges for the upper level classes are not hard lines. Levels consist of Challenge A (ages 12-13), B (ages 13-14) and Challenge 1-4 (ages 14 and up).

We follow the classical model of education, which are three stages of learning that are called grammar, dialectic and rhetoric. In the grammar stage it is important to learn lots of basic information or to answer the question "what". For example what is 4 x 3? Then the dialectic stage answers the question of "why". At this level they would be practicing algebra and other upper level math. It is so important to master the "what" of any given subject before you can really start putting it together to do higher level thinking and practicing with the subject. Then once a student has mastered the "what" and had sufficient practice with the "why". Then they are capable of knowing the "how" of the rhetoric stage and teaching someone else or having a finished product. If you think of baking bread, there are lots of "whats" to know about. "What is flour, yeast, pans, ovens, etc". Then when you are beginning to bake, there are lots of "whys". "Why do we preheat the oven, why do we put the ingredients together in this manner?" Finally, after we have done those steps, we are rhetorical because we have a finished product of bread. We have also baked it enough times to have a consistent bread product and could teach someone else how to bake bread.

Getting back to Classical Conversations, we will meet once a week starting in September. Our Foundations program runs 24 weeks. Our Challenge programs meet 30 weeks. Foundations requires that a parent be present and participate somewhat in class. The classes are a maximum of eight students with a maximum of eight classes divided by age. All of the students learn the same material for history, math, Latin, timeline, geography, bible, science, and English. They also do a science experiment, art, and presentations each week. The classes are lead by trained tutors from 9:15am-12:15pm. The afternoon of our Foundations program is for students 3/4 grade through age 11 or 12. They work 45 minutes of English Grammar, 30 minutes of math drill and 45 minutes of writing using the Institute for Excellence in Writing from 1-3PM. Children that are not eligible for the afternoon go to aftercare while their siblings and mothers are in class. In all of our programs, we consider the tutors, tutors that introduce material and help the students practice it and review it. Moms are the teachers and responsible for all work that is done and any grades that they choose to give. In the Foundations, a math program and a language arts program needs to be added.

I hope that this answers some of your questions. Please feel free to call me if you need.

I have 5 children with between the ages of 12 years-3 months. I have really enjoyed Classical Conversations because it streamlines my day by allowing my all children to be working on the same material, their science experiment and art gets done every week and they get to practice public speaking in a small group setting. I also like the fact that I don't have to keep buying new curriculum each year for each child. I already know year to year what we will be working on and I only needed to buy it one time for the whole family!
