PREREQUISITES/GRADE LEVEL RECOMMENDATIONS:

Completion of a pre-algebra course with a "C" or higher.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Students will learn about signed numbers, exponents, and roots; absolute value; equations and inequalities; scientific notations; unit conversions; polynomials; graphs; factoring; quadratic equations; direct and inverse variations; exponential growth; statistics; and probability in this Algebra 1 course. (Description from the CBD website.)

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

The student is responsible for completing all assignments, turning them in on time, and participating in all classroom activities and discussions. All students are required to bring their notebooks, textbooks, writing utensils, and paper to class each day. Students will be given a schedule with a daily breakdown of work required. One homework assignment per week will be graded in order to ensure students are completing the assignments. Tests will be administered in-class and/or at home, with parents proctoring when the tests are administered at home.

Students will be required to register (for free) with virtualhomeschool.com in order to have access to daily lectures which accompany each lesson. These lectures may be required for viewing when difficult concepts are introduced, snow days occur, or as instructors deem necessary.

***Due to the fact that Saxon math builds upon itself, students will be required to complete the lessons in their entirety if they register for this class.**

GRADING:

While 4 lessons will be assigned per week, only one homework assignment will be graded, chosen at random from the four completed lessons. In addition, one test per week will be assigned, to be proctored by the parents at home. This test will also be graded by the instructors.

PREREQUISITES/GRADE LEVEL RECOMMENDATIONS:

8th -10th Grade

*Students should have completed pre-algebra and should be enrolled in Algebra I or II in order to succeed in this class.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to be a thorough overview of the branches of natural science that study non-living systems. The course covers such topics as the basic principles of astronomy and chemistry, as well as the basic principles of earth science and physics.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

The student is responsible for completing all assignments, turning them in on time, and participating in all discussions. Every student is required to bring in their notebook, textbook, writing utensils, and paper to class each day. Because Physical Science is a subject that builds on itself, students will need to keep up with each topic or they will fall behind.

GRADING:

Parents will be given a copy of all recorded grades the students earn throughout the year.

This course will require 30 minutes to one hour of homework (reading and assignments) each day. Students will be required to keep a notebook. Quizzes will be given in class each week and formal tests will be given every two weeks to be administered at home with parental supervision. In addition, students will be required to type at least one lab report per week.

8th-9th grade or above

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to be a student's first systematic introduction to the sciences. The course covers such topics as the scientific method, designing experiments, simple machines, archaeology, geology, paleontology, biology, and human anatomy and physiology. Its scope, therefore, is quite wide. There are many hands-on experiments to do, some in class, and some at home.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

The student is responsible for completing all assignments, turning them in on time, and participating in all discussions and problem-solving sessions. If the student misses class for any reason, it is the student's responsibility to find out what assignments and notes he/she missed. All students are required to bring their notebooks, textbooks, writing utensils, finished assignments, and paper to class each day. General science is a subject that builds on itself. Please keep up with each topic, or you will fall farther and farther behind.

GRADING:

Grades will be issued based on homework, tests, and quizzes. This course will require at least 1 hour of homework (reading and assignments) each day. Because this class builds on itself, the student will be required to complete ALL assignments. If students are unable to complete assignments, they will be asked to leave the program. Late work will be penalized if accepted.

Students must have completed General Science or Physical Science

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed to be the student's first high school science course and is a college-prep biology course that provides a detailed introduction to the methods and concepts of general biology. Heavily emphasizing the vocabulary of biology, it provides the student with a strong background in the scientific method, the five-kingdom classification scheme, microscopy, biochemistry, cellular biology, molecular and Mendelian genetics, evolution, dissection, and ecosystems. It also provides a complete survey of the five kingdoms in Creation. Students who take and understand this course will be very well-prepared for a tough university biology course.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

The student is responsible for completing all assignments, turning them in on time, and participating in all discussions and problem-solving sessions. If the student misses a class or fails to turn in an assignment, it is the student's responsibility to find out what work, assignments, and notes he or she missed and complete those assignments.

GRADING:

This course will require at least 1 hour of homework (reading and assignments) each day. Students will be required to write one lab report each week (There will be exceptions to this). Quizzes will be given in class each week. Formal tests will be given every two weeks and administered at home with parental supervision. There will be a Final Exam at the end of the year.

PREREQUISITES/GRADE LEVEL RECOMMENDATIONS:

The student must have taken the FAITH Language Arts Placement Test or be a previous class participant.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Language Arts B is designed to instill a love of the written word, both in reading and discussion of literature, as well as written composition. In this course, students will review foundational grammar and be introduced to the formal analysis of literature prior to the application of both elements. Each student will develop a resource guide for use throughout the course.

Literature: Students will read the assigned literature at home according to the provided schedule. Books will either be provided by Faith or will be available through a free online source such as The Gutenberg Project. In each class, students will gather weekly as a literature circle to share thoughtful discussion, critical analysis of the text, focusing on significant details and patterns to develop a deep, precise understanding of the text's form, crafts, and meanings. Books are intentionally selected to provide a broad variety of genre, characterization, conflict type, settings and writing style.

Composition: Students will be introduced to writing for the purpose of finding their 'voice' in practicing the art of getting what's in our heads out on the paper in a cohesive, well written manner. We will cover a broad range of writing formats including, but not limited to: journaling, letter writing, creative story writing, descriptive writing practices. Some of our writing will be based on the literature reading at the instructor's discretion.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

Each student is expected to be respectful of himself, other students, and the instructors and to do his best. Students are to complete all assignments on time. You can expect to spend approximately 45 minutes per day completing homework. If a student misses a class, he/she is responsible for obtaining and completing the assigned work. Any work turned in late (without instructor approval for family or medical reasons) or incomplete will be penalized. Each student should bring all required supplies to each class session.

GRADING:

Grades will be emailed each quarter. A rubric will be provided.

The student must have taken the FAITH Language Arts Placement Test or be a previous class participant.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Language Arts C is geared for students who have mastered basic writing skills, including the ability to compose complete sentences and paragraphs. Our primary focus will be on sentence structure and stylistic technique. Each semester will include grammar, literature, and writing, with a heavy emphasis on essays and literature.

We will supply each student with a copy of *Easy Grammar Ultimate – Grade 10*, student text.

Literature will focus on medieval literature, to include *Sir Gawain and the Green Knight*, *Beowulf*, *The Canterbury Tales* and an assortment of ancient literary texts. (Since the class is still in planning stages, this may change.)

Students will participate in several essay contests throughout the school year.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

The student is responsible for completing all assignments and turning them in on time. If the student misses a class or fails to turn in an assignment, it is the student's responsibility to find out what work, assignments, and notes he or she missed and complete those assignments. Homework is due at the beginning at each class. If a student does not have his or her homework (due to printer problems, family obligations, illness, etc.), he or she must have a written or verbal explanation from the parent, verifying the student's excuse. Email is not acceptable.

GRADING:

Parents are asked to keep up with their student's grades. Due to the nature of writing assignments, not all homework will be issued an official grade. Efforts will be made to issue grades frequently, but parents should maintain their own records (as papers are returned) in addition to the records kept by graders with FAITH Academics.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Introduction

The world is rapidly changing through the introduction and broad acceptance of ideas that, to us as Christians, sound strange and sometimes even bizarre. The purpose of the Worldview Classes is to provide students with an understanding of the origin of these ideas and compare and contrast them with the beliefs of Christianity. There are 2 courses, each of which can be studied independently. ***Understanding the Times*** is a comparison of Christianity with the other prominent worldviews and ***Understanding the Culture*** focuses on a critique of contemporary American culture through the lens of Christian ideas.

Understanding the Faith – Fall Semester

Understanding the Times is a semester-long class that compares and contrasts Christian ideas with those of the other prominent worldviews that people believe. The course begins with a survey of these worldviews (Christianity, Islam, Secularism, Marxism, New Spirituality (New Age), and Postmodernism). It then compares and contrasts how the worldviews answer important questions in 10 specific areas ranging from Theology to History. The class is lecture/discussion driven, with emphasis on addressing and answering fully student questions and issues about course topics.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

Students are responsible to complete all assigned work and do the required readings in advance of class to be able to participate effectively in classroom discussions. Students will also be responsible for turning in all graded materials on time.

GRADING:

Graded work will consist of weekly reading assignments, 3 tests, and a final exam.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Christian Apologetics and Worldview: Odd Years

Introduction

The purpose of the Worldview Classes is to provide students with an understanding of the origin of these ideas and compare and contrast them with the beliefs of Christianity. There are 2 courses, each of which can be studied independently. ***Understanding the Times*** is a comparison of Christianity with the other prominent worldviews and ***Understanding the Culture*** focuses on a critique of contemporary American culture through the lens of Christian ideas.

Understanding the Culture – Spring Semester

Understanding the Culture is a semester long course on how Christians should engage society in the realm of culture. Our culture is all around us and, like a fish in water, we take it for granted without even noticing. Yet the books we read, the movies and TV shows we watch and the songs we listen to have a tremendous impact on shaping how we view the world. It is therefore vital that we not take our culture for granted, but instead examine it through the lens of Christian truth and values. This course will compare and contrast societal and Christian worldviews on topics like technology, the value of human life, politics, marriage, sexuality, and justice with the aim of making us more effective as standing as salt and light in the world we live in.

Students are responsible to complete all assigned work and do the required readings in advance of class to be able to participate effectively in classroom discussions. Students will also be responsible for turning in all graded materials on time.

GRADING:

Graded work will consist of weekly reading assignments, 3 tests, and a final exam.

PREREQUISITES/GRADE LEVEL RECOMMENDATIONS:

6th-12th grades. No prior experience is required.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Students will develop a geographic literacy as they study the lands, features and inhabitants of the Earth. They will be able to explain the biblical history of how God spread the nations by dividing Pangea into the seven continental regions recognized today. Throughout the one credit, full year social studies course, students will learn to identify each geographic region, including major physical features (oceans, rivers, mountains, etc.) and political boundaries. Further, students will take an anthropological view of the people groups who inhabit those regions. Language, faith and culture, especially as impacted by their geography, will be explored.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

Each student is expected to be respectful of himself, other students, and the instructors and to do his or her best. Students are to complete all assignments on time. You can expect to spend approximately 20-30 minutes a day for homework, which includes tracing and memorizing maps, and researching a people group to present each quarter. If a student misses a class, he/she is responsible for obtaining and completing the assigned work. Any work turned in late (without instructor approval for family or medical reasons) or incomplete will be penalized. Each student should bring all required supplies to each class session.

PREREQUISITES/GRADE LEVEL RECOMMENDATIONS:

9th-12th grades

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This will be an introductory course in Business Administration. We will cover topics such as forms of ownership, barriers to entry, market structures, economics, supply & demand, business ethics, business law, accounting, management, marketing, and entrepreneurship.

This will be a very hands-on class broken down into 3 parts: classroom education, developing a business plan, and completing a charity event to raise money.

This class will be primarily focused on starting a small business. Each student will be expected to create a complete business plan (for the business of his/her choosing) throughout the semester. This business plan will be presented to the class on the last day of class as their final exam.

The class will also plan a charity event throughout the semester and then have the event at the end of the semester.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES:

The student is responsible for having class materials ready, completing assignments, turning them in on time, and participating in lessons.

GRADING:

This will be ungraded by the instructor, but the parent may assign a grade at the end of the semester.
