



Our Curriculum:

- English, language arts, mathematics, geography, spelling, and handwriting are taught using The Good and The Beautiful, a non-denominational Christian, academically-sound curriculum based on United States frameworks
- Emphasizes family, God, character building, nature, community, and wholesome literature
- Charlotte Mason science coursebook, with plenty of time spent outdoors exploring nature, lays the foundation for lessons
- Science, technology, engineering, arts, mathematics, social studies, history, Spanish, and music enrichment classes, project-based learning, and field trips
- Entrepreneur program for each grade level based on fruits, vegetables, and other plants that the land produces
- Customizable for families that want the flexibility of traveling but are concerned about children missing lessons — open the book and follow the instructions while away
- Combines multiple subjects, which connects learning and eliminates the need for 6-7 subjects (for example, geography is incorporated into language arts lessons)
- Thorough phonics reading program that creates excellent readers
- Thorough and advanced courses to leave no gaps
- ELA and mathematics coursework spirals back to previously learned information so that students can master topics by the end of the year
