## Ethical Society Friday Classes

Title	Description	Min Age	Max Age
Art Class	<p>Art Class is a fun, hands-on series of exploratory projects for any art-interested, crafty maker, age 8 to 14 years old. We will engage in a range of projects, from weaving, simple book-making, assemblage sculpture, and more. Each session, the Art Class co-teachers will introduced a project, and go over tools and materials, and all participating artists are encouraged to relax, explore and enjoy bringing their ideas to life. There are no skill requirements for this class, though students will use glue guns at various points during the semester, so we encourage thoughtful, responsible, and safe use of tools. We will have a few projects involving paint and/or paint pens, though most projects have a low probability for staining clothes. Dress as you see fit.</p>	8	14
Deep Thoughts	<p>This class is inspired by the TV show The Good Place. We will explore philosophy and ethics through informal class discussions and activities. We will apply these ideas to real life and also look at how these ideas show up in art, pop culture, etc.</p> <p>Students should be prepared to discuss challenging ideas and be open to listening respectfully to others' viewpoints. Students should be prepared for a small amount of homework- for example, Look up X and tell us what you learned, or watch this 15 min video and be prepared to discuss it.</p>	12	18
Enrichment for Littles	<p>Every class period will be centered around a different theme. We will use the theme to guide our learning in the areas of literature, poetry, pre-literacy, emotional intelligence, math, science, and art.</p> <p>Geared towards ages 3-5 (ages are flexible, so feel free to signup your child if you think it would be a good fit)</p>	3	5
Grammar Games!	<p>Hands-on approach to language arts!</p> <p>This course is based on content covered in lesson books for 3-5th grade, but accessible for general elementary use. We will play grammar games like verb/adverb charades and preposition hide n seek, complete silly fill-ins, learn punctuation, and MORE!</p> <p>Students do not need strong writing skills for this class. Students will not be required to sit for the entire class period, as many of the activities involve movement.</p>	6	11
Introduction to Sign Language	<p>Students will learn basic sign language letters, words and simple sentence combinations. This course will be interactive, as students will practice both expressive and receptive sign language skills each time we meet.</p>	10	18
Nursery	<p>Nursery childcare offered by fellow parents when baby's/toddler's parents are busy teaching another class</p>	0	2

Pokémon Club	<p>Pokémon Club is for your young Pokemon enthusiast, from beginner to more experienced.</p> <p>Kids will learn about and discuss a variety of Pokémon, trade cards, play the trading card game (TCG), and may engage in other Pokémon-related activities.</p> <p>Beyond Pokémon, the kids will work on social skills and informal cooperative learning. The goal is for all of the kids to teach and learn from each other as they share their love of Pokémon.</p> <p>Pokémon Club kiddos should bring their own Pokémon cards. If they have books or other Pokémon items they may bring them to share with others during meetups.</p> <p>There may be fun, optional homework for show-and-tell.</p>	5	12
Word Games and Brain Teasers	<p>Join me each time at ES for an hour of puzzles, word games, and brain teasers. Format will vary as I will introduce different types of puzzles each class. Sometimes puzzles will be worked out individually, other times we will work as teams or together with the whole class,</p> <p>I would like to sometimes offer candy rewards for solving puzzles, so please inform me if your student has a food allergy or other dietary restriction. All the supplies needed for class are a pen or pencil and a brain ready to think outside the box!</p>	12	18
Beginner Cross Stitch	<p>Learn to cross stitch and create your own piece of artwork!</p> <p>All supplies will be provided and you will choose a free pattern to use.</p> <p>No prior experience necessary.</p>	10	18
Chess	<p>Come play chess with friends and learn new strategies! Class will be facilitated by recent graduate Porter Cowan. Understanding of basic chess rules is required. Equipment will be provided.</p>	8	19
Fun with Books	<p>In this class, we will have fun with a different picture book each week. We will read our book together as a group, and then enjoy a literacy activity that goes along with the story we have read. Literacy activities may include talking about the story, singing songs, playing sound and word games, completing a craft or drawing, reader's theater, STEAM activities, or any other fun activity that will serve as an engaging extension of our shared story.</p>	5	10
Inclusive Sex Ed for Teens with Planned Parenthood	<p>Come talk and learn with Planned Parenthood Educators. Topics will range from healthy relationships, consent, pleasure, safer sex, and much more. Sign up to join the conversation! During the first class, youth will get to know one another and discuss what they'd most be interested in learning with the educators (who may vary; the name listed is just the parent organizing the class, who will not be teaching).</p> <p>Parents should use their discretion signing up and know that the educators are completely open to whatever the youth would like to discuss and any topics are welcome.</p> <p>There may be occasional homework but nothing heavy or time-consuming. Some classes may have none.</p>	13	19

Interactive Geometry	Introduce/reinforce concepts of basic geometry including shape attributes: names and properties, corners and sides; polygons: sides and angles; symmetry, and patterns. Students will participate in a variety of engaging, hands-on activities during this shape-themed unit including Tangrams, Geoboards, Tessellate art, and more!	4	10
Oceanography	<p>We'll continue our study of the ocean this semester with Oceanography this semester.</p> <p>Oceanography is the study of the physical, chemical, and biological features of the ocean, including the ocean's ancient history, its current condition, and its future. In a time when the ocean is threatened by climate change and pollution, coastlines are eroding, and entire species of marine life are at risk of extinction, the role of oceanographers may be more important now than it has ever been.</p> <p>We'll learn what Oceanographers do and explore some of the topics involved.</p> <p>Class will include reading, discussion, written and hands on activities. A pencil and binder might come in handy, but not required. There may be some homework, such as completing a worksheet or finishing a project.</p>	10	14
The Terrible Head: Writing and Performing a Play	<p>Students will work together to craft a short play script based on The Terrible Head, a story from Andrew Lang's Blue Fairy Book. Human Body Basics	<p>Come join us as we learn about the amazing human body! Each week we will learn about a particular body system (skeletal, cardiovascular, digestive, nervous, muscular, respiratory, urinary, integumentary, sensory). We will learn basic anatomy and physiology for each system and engage in hands on learning activities/experiments for each system.</p> <p>Masks recommended, however may become mandatory should a need arise. Classes will be taught outside as weather permits as well.</p>	6	9

Magical Creatures	<p>In this class, students learn about a wide range of magical creatures. We will learn their characteristics, diet, habitat, and more. Students will do crafts and/or play games to go along with the week's spotlight creatures. At the end of the session, each child will create their own magical creature and present it to the class.</p> <p>Children will create their own magical creature during class time and present it to the class.</p>	6	11
Modern Music & Social Change	<p>We will discuss the roots of modern music; its evolution and how social history was changed by challenging the establishment.</p> <p>We will examine music in relation to; civil rights, LBGQTIA+ rights, feminism and Vietnam (both as a support to those who served and as a voice for those who opposed).</p> <p>We will be viewing and discussing sensitive topics in this course.</p> <p>Once rosters are complete, I will provide an outline for parents so they can see which subjects will be discussed in each session.</p> <p>Music may contain explicit lyrics (I will try to keep that to a minimum unless it somehow specifically applies)</p> <p>Class includes a field trip to the Missouri History Museum on 11/08/2022.</p>	13	18
Open Legend RPG	<p>Open legend is an ttrpg or table-top roleplaying game similar to DND, where the players work together to make a story based on their characters actions, guided by the Gamemaster who decides the actions of the in-game world. Our first session will be character creation and groundrules.</p> <p>I'd encourage everyone to familiarize yourself with the website (<a href="https://openlegendrpg.com/core-rules/character-creation/">https://openlegendrpg.com/core-rules/character-creation/</a>). Players will be told how to play and the rules in class.</p>	10	19
Preschool Play	<p>Come join us for Preschool fun!! We will sing, craft, and read stories together all while getting our wiggles out!</p>	3	5
Reading Buddy Book Club	<p>The idea is for kids of multiple age groups to connect through a love of books while growing their reading skills.</p> <p>We will pair older kids who love to read with a primary-aged reading buddy. Depending on the combination of kids that sign up, the ratio will be either 1 big kid to 1 little kid or 1 big kid to 2 little kids. We will set out a selection of books to choose from... or the two buddies may want to bring a favorite book from home to share. The buddies will spend 20 minutes reading together and 20 minutes on a post-book activity, like draw your favorite scene or character; summarize or pitch your book to the group; compare your book to another one you've read.</p> <p>For ages 5-7 and 11-15.</p>	5	15

Visible Mending	<p>Let's fix some textiles and prevent fast fashion from clogging landfills and beaches. First class period we will talk about what visible mending is and what purposes it serves. From discussions that first class period, I will plan what will be discussed in later classes and we will plan for students to bring in their own items from home to work with and repair.</p> <p>Please know that mending, visible or not, is very often rooted in a long history of making do with very little and your financial means will never preclude you from participating.</p> <p>*Social distancing - highly preferred</p> <p>*Masks - please wear a mask; I am immunocompromised and have an autoimmune condition that puts me at high risk of drastic long-term complications from COVID and cannot afford to put myself at more risk than necessary</p> <p>*Homework - I am anticipating that there will not be enough time in each session for students to complete the mends they begin during class. While I will absolutely not be grading or otherwise demanding that students bring in completed projects the next class period, I also will not stop presenting new information in subsequent class periods so that a student can finish before continuing with the next technique. Therefore, it would behoove students to work on their mends from each class at home so that they can be completed before the next class period and students get that additional time practicing stitching before coming in to the next class.</p>	9	18

"Ban this Book" Book Club	<p>This class will be a book club specifically dedicated to the book titled, Ban this Book. We will take an active look at the topic of censorship and the banning of books. The discussion will remain age-appropriate but allow for conversation and debate around the topic of censorship. The book is inspiring, thought-provoking, and hilarious. My kids have loved this book, and I hope yours will too!</p> <p>A copy of the book will be needed but can be made available free of charge to any families who do not have a copy or cannot obtain one for any reason.</p> <p>Book overview:</p> <p>You're Never Too Young to Fight Censorship!</p> <p>In Ban This Book by Alan Gratz, a fourth grader fights back when From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler by E. L. Konigsburg is challenged by a well-meaning parent and taken off the shelves of her school library. Amy Anne is shy and soft-spoken, but don't mess with her when it comes to her favorite book in the whole world. Amy Anne and her lieutenants wage a battle for the books that will make you laugh and pump your fists as they start a secret banned books locker library, make up ridiculous reasons to ban every single book in the library to make a point, and take a stand against censorship.</p> <p>Ban This Book is a stirring defense against censorship that's perfect for middle grade readers. Let kids know that they can make a difference in their schools, communities, and lives!</p>	9	13
ACT Prep for Teens (and their adults)	<p>Tim spent several years teaching ACT prep for the high school where he teaches with decent gains for his students from the beginning to the end of the semester. This single class will go over some basic tips and tricks on answering questions on the ACT as well as suggestions on how to prepare at home for the test. This class will be geared toward teens with their adult in attendance as well as solo adults looking to prepare test prep practice for their student.</p>	14	17
Adulting	<p>Another semester of adulting. We will continue to use zoom for this class. Dates and Times will depend on the students' best fit and what fits with the presenter for that particular class. I do not currently have speakers lined up but will be taking recommendations and reaching out to the group for any interested. This class focuses on having an adult discuss their career, path to get there, and how it relates to being an adult in the real world when applicable. No masking or social distancing requirements, just please be respectful of other family's comfort levels. Animal Academy	<p>Visit the St. Louis region's largest pet resource center located in East St. Louis, IL. Gateway Pet Guardians is dedicated to keeping pets and people together by providing them with the programs and resources needed to help them care for their pets.</p> <p>In this class, you will get to see the resource center in action. You will see and interact with dogs and cats being sheltered at the facility awaiting their new homes. Additionally, we will observe surgery by one of the community's best shelter medicine veterinarians. What is shelter medicine? We will talk about how it's a bit different than the veterinary clinic you may go to. We will also talk about those cats roaming around your neighborhood and why they don't need to be rescued.</p> <p>The class is still evolving but there is no shortage of things to learn and questions to ask! The animal welfare industry in the US has recently shifted to offering more support to keep families together instead of separating pets from their families due to lack of resources.</p> <p>I am the former Executive Director of Gateway Pet Guardians and have been working at the national level for the past year with animal shelters throughout the country. I hope this class will inspire all of the young minds to consider a career in animal welfare to make our world a better place!</p>	0	19
Architectural Gems of Downtown St. Louis	<p>Join a local architect on a walking tour of downtown architecture and monuments, followed by a tour of his architectural office, right next to the arch. The tour is a preset list of St. Louis landmarks, but we're bound to find other buildings that are super cool to talk about. (his wife talking here: he is willing to answer questions about things you observe. I personally like to ask him what is that thing called or why is it there or what is it made of.)</p>	9	adult
Banned Books - Book Club	<p>This will be a book club specifically for banned books. The class will be geared toward reading and dissecting banned books. Taking a look at the rationale behind their banned status and having constructive conversations around the book contents. The goal is to have an open mind, dialogue and debate in a healthy environment, while also unpacking the topic of censorship. There are so many wonderful books that fall into this banned status and I hope to help the kids understand the value of reading banned books and thinking critically about their topics.</p> <p>This session of this course is geared toward older students. That however, will not necessarily dictate the age range of the books (some may be for younger readers). Book selection will be determined ahead of our first class. I'd like the kids to have input into the book(s) they would like to read. I do have a second session for younger students that specifically covers the book titled, Ban this Book and it would be a great jumping off point for any student who is not familiar with banned books.</p>	13	18



BIBS Home Service Shop Class	We will be creating Christmas tree yard decorations. These can be rustic looking or can be painted in fantastical colors to match your own holiday decorations. Students will be able to choose whether they want to make one tree or up to three trees all different sizes (not to exceed 3 feet). Trees will also include stands so they can be placed on a porch or in the yard. These could be wonderful to keep or fun to give as holiday gifts! As always, all materials are provided.	9	18

Mystery of Flight tour will be added to this program (an additional 10 min video) - how airplanes work and have evolved  Free Parking, Free Admission, Wheelchair Accessible. Child-led Art History at the St. Louis Art Museum	Join me as I share my love of art history. We will walk through the St. Louis Art Museum and focus on one (child-determined) period of art history. I'll offer 3 different time periods or artistic movements, and the students will decide on which to focus on first; if there is time or if attention wanes, we will move on to the next. Our discussions and observations will be peppered with connections to historical events, the society of the times, the composition of the works, and the details of the artistic techniques. If you want to bring your own art supplies, they will be welcomed, and I will have some to share.</p> <p>If anyone is interested in demonstrations of easy art techniques or words to put in the cards, I will provide samples, and Benjamin is happy to demonstrate how to draw cute holiday inspired (non religious so that all seniors receiving cards will feel valued) kawaii drawings in the cards. I will welcome other children demonstrating techniques too. Diversity and Inclusion Club	<p>In this club for ages 7-11, we'll openly discuss the many wonderful differences in our world community. Topics will include LGBTQIA+, races, religions, identity, abilities, families and social justice. There will be frank conversations.</p> <p>Students will be welcome to help host an SLHN information table at Pride.</p> <p>This club will be for anybody who wants to learn about, support or advocate for others. Earth Science Experiments	<p>This is a three part class.</p> <p>This class will allow your kids to learn how mountains form, volcanos erupt, islands form and the way that weather leads to rock erosion all using messy hands-on experiments. The classes will be at my house and be mostly indoors (volcano eruptions outside). I will try and cover a little bit about each topic before we start our experiment and I am asking that parents stay to help their kids if needed. I have a large kid friendly basement space if littles need to stay and play.</p> <p>I will be using elemental science K-4th grade as my core curriculum and will have a list of extra reading and recourses available for anyone that would like to take a deep dive into earth science.</p>	5	10

Economy Museum	<p>This is a FREE class!</p> <p>The Inside the Economy Museum immerses guests in a one-of-a-kind experience that explains the economy and their role in it through nearly 100 fun, hands-on exhibits with games, sculptures, videos, and displays. The museum begins with an exciting introductory video set in the historic teller booths of the bank, and then leads visitors into the four zones that comprise the rest of the experience. Interactive touch screens and games teach guests how to make various investment and expense decisions, and the impact of those decisions on the micro and macro economy. The sleek and immersive space then carries guests to a stock-trading interactive where they can assume the roles of buyers and sellers and compete with one another. Amongst a myriad of other fun and educational games and films, the museum introduces them to the functions of the bank and how the major ebbs and flows of the economy affect them and different communities around the world.</p> <p>This should be a fun and interesting day to learn a bit about the money we use everyday. Each participant can leave with a small bag of shredded money.</p> <p>The Economy Museum requires every participant to not only be fully vaccinated, but to have a booster shot as well. You can either bring in your vaccine card or a photo copy on your phone to show when you arrive. The tour should last around 90 minutes.</p>	8	18

<p>Forest Friends</p>	<p>This gathering will include a nature study component as well as lots of time for unstructured play in the woods.</p> <p>The nature study portion will cover some North American mammals (various types of rabbits and hares, squirrels, rodents, etc.) using the first nine chapters of <i>The Burgess Animal Book for Children</i> by Thornton Burgess. We will gather at the pavilion and read one chapter per week, share discussion of the new animals covered and use our nature journals to sketch the animal. Students will explore St. Louis through the lives and experiences of African Americans who have called this city home. Through hands-on activities and engaging discussions, students will use primary sources to forge personal connections to the people and places that have shaped St. Louis. Learning about the Black individuals living both extraordinary and everyday lives will expand students' understanding of the city's history.

This program focuses on engaging students with two essential understandings:

- 1) African Americans have always been an integral part of the United States (and St. Louis) and have impacted and shaped our history and culture.
- 2) While challenging, the lived experiences of African Americans in St. Louis have been and continue to be rich and diverse.

Students will visit three areas in the Seeking St. Louis galleries, each representing different time periods in St. Louis history.

At Stop One, students will visit the home of the free Black woman Jeanette Forchet, who lived in St. Louis around 1790. They will use primary sources—including artifacts from her home, a copy of her inventory, and the replica of her house—to infer what Jeanette's daily life was like. Students will compare and contrast their home life with that of this historical figure.

At Stop Two, students will examine some of the professions and Black businesses that have helped shaped St. Louis from the 1800s into the 1900s. Students will draw conclusions about how history is recorded and shared and decide who should be added to the galleries' walls.

At Stop Three, students will learn more about Black artists and culture-shapers who have lived in St. Louis. They will analyze how different forms of art and artisan work both shape and reflect society as well as how art can help define cultural identities even as it breaks down barriers between different groups.

**IN THE CLASSROOM**

Following the tour, students will explore additional primary-source documents during a classroom activity while forging personal connections to the people, places, and events of St. Louis's Black history.

The final hour of the program will be free exploration of the museum's History Clubhouse, a hands-on gallery designed especially for children.

Siblings are welcome to stay (please register older siblings staying for the class). If you have a younger child that needs to be otherwise engaged, they are welcome to explore the History Clubhouse during class time (with a care giver present). If you plan to have a class participant present without a caregiver while taking a younger sibling to the clubhouse, please let me know ahead of time so I can ensure there are enough chaperones for the program.

The museum is wheelchair accessible, has accessible parking and is close to public transportation. There is a nursing and sensory-friendly room on the lower level.

The museum does not currently require masks but they are recommended when social distancing is not possible.

<p>MO History Museum: Community Superheroes</p>	<p>Community Superheroes</p> <p>During this program, children will discover what it takes to be a superhero in their community! Children will engage in interactive storytelling, make a craft, and explore the Seeking St. Louis exhibit in search of St. Louisans who showed compassion, self-confidence and leadership in their communities!</p> <p>Younger and older siblings are welcome to stay with the group.</p> <p>Alternatively, they may visit the Kids Clubhouse during the class time, accompanied by a caregiver. Project based programming with Python	<p>This class will be a full introduction to programming in the Python programming language. It will be aimed at students with beginner-novice skills in programming.</p> <p>The first half of the semester will be dedicated to programming concepts and practices, the second half of the semester will be used to build a final project which will be a Classic Arcade Game (Breakout most likely). Parents and other family members will be invited to the final class to play the game their child builds.</p> <p>Each week a new concept will be taught and the students will be given a project to complete that makes use of that concept.</p> <p>* One class will start with the students demonstrating their solution to the project from the week before.
