

2018-19 Course Descriptions

The descriptions here give an overview of each course. Please note that some courses in the high school level have prerequisites or specific skills that must be mastered. Certain courses have separate lab or supply fees that will be used by the instructor to cover materials and expenses for the class.

Please also note that classes have a minimum and maximum number of students due to space and cost considerations. All classes are filled on a first-come, first-serve basis. On occasion, classes may need to be canceled before they begin, due either to lack of adequate enrollment or teacher fulfillment. If this should occur, you will be notified immediately by e-mail and/or phone call, and money you have paid toward the class will be refunded. Elementary Classes

1st-2nd Grade Classes

The 1st & 2nd grade classes will run from 8:45-12:00 and be divided into two segments with a snack break and outdoor play in between.

Segment 1 will focus on language activities that will include book units, social studies concepts and art interspersed into the activities. Segment 2 will focus on simple science concepts and math activities. When the weather is nice, a period of outdoor play will be added. Suggested follow-up activities will be sent home with the student each week; they will not be required. You may choose to enroll your child in one or both segments. Note: these classes are supplemental and do not meet the reading or math instructional requirements for the state of Maryland.

5/6 Science This class continues building on the foundation of science facts and skills for the further study of science in the upper grades. The colorful materials, filled with photographs, charts, diagrams, and illustrations, balances the presentation of facts with active participation in order to promote understanding and instill in your child a love of learning. Topics include the following: minerals, fossils, matter, light, weather, ecosystems, and the human body. All lessons are presented within a Biblical worldview to help your child develop knowledge of God. Students will become versed with perspectives, design elements, still lifes, grid drawings, portraiture and collage. 7/8 English This course is designed to help students become more thoughtful and critical readers and more deliberate and skillful writers. The course is literature-based and writing-intensive. It requires students to participate actively, as individuals and in groups, discussions, and projects. Four novels will be read and examined using study guides. Writing assignments include comparison essays, research reports, and journals. The year will culminate with a small-group project in which students create a video commercial. In addition, a grammar assignment will be given each week. Parents will be required to check grammar homework weekly.

7/8 Earth Science Earth Science will be rooted in a Biblical perspective on the study and care of God's world. The following topics will be covered this year: Geology, The Dynamic Earth, Water and Water Systems, Astronomy, Meteorology and the Environment. 7/8 Middle School Art This class will be comprised of two individual semesters. Students may take one or both. Throughout the months, students will learn/focus on the Elements and Principles of Design. Students will develop skills needed to analyze and interpret both art of today and art of history past. Classes will include drawing, painting, building/sculpting, and mixed media. From Picasso soda can heads, 3D starburst perspective collages, and scratchboard feathers, to pattern design, junk boxes and bug explosion pieces – there's something in this class for every artist. The goal: to grow those art skills and comprehension, and to utilize those artistic skills in all aspects of life. Homework will be weekly and mandatory. This class will receive a grade.

MS/HS Choir (spring semester) Our choral ensemble is for anyone in middle or high school who has a desire to sing together. We will be learning a variety of styles of music, blending in unison, and dividing into three- or four-part harmony. The goal is to sing well, but also to sing with a joyful heart to the Lord. The class includes preparation for an evening musical presentation. Practice MP3s will be provided for reinforcement at home. No previous singing experience is required. Any musicians (parents and students) who are available to accompany the ensemble instrumentally are also welcome. (Note: Accompanists do not pay for the class.)

MS/HS Beginning Digital Photography (spring semester) This course, designed with middle school and high school in mind, is an introduction to the basics of digital photography from understanding how your cameral works (What all those buttons are for and how do I use them?) to the end result of creating a beautiful photograph! Topics covered, but not limited to, are understanding and using manual mode (the photographic triangle of ISO, shutter speed and aperture), creative composition, how to see and use light effectively, and how to pose people and groups. High School Classes

9th-10th Grade Composition & Literary Analysis This course will focus on a variety of genres from different time periods to illustrate the breadth and depth of literature. Students will investigate different literary devices, learn to apply them in their own writing, and begin to discern the worldviews presented in these works, concentrating especially on Christian Theism and Romanticism. Books will include Uncle Tom's Cabin, Ivanhoe, Silas Marner, and Macbeth, with one more TBA. The special theme of the composition portion of the class this year is "Writing for your audience." The class will also include the following special units: creative writing, and the research paper. Required Skills: Students should be competent readers and should have taken a 7th-8th grade English class or equivalent. A placement test can be given as needed.

11th-12th Grade British Literature This course will cover the development of the English language and worldviews through the study of British Literature. Students will read Beowulf, The Canterbury Tales (selections), Much Ado About Nothing, and Frankenstein, another work TBA and short stories and poems. Students will identify worldviews and literary techniques within the works they are reading. Writing will include many different styles of essays, a lecture, an MLA-style research essay, and some creative writing.

<u>Prerequisite</u>: Students should have completed a 9th/10th-grade English course (or equivalent), know basic literary terms, and have experience writing research papers and short papers or essays. A placement test may be given.

HS Just Writing This course is designed to give high school students lots of practice and guidance in all nonfiction writing modes: persuasion, exposition, description, and narration. The goal is to equip them with tools and skills that every writer needs for high school, college, and professional writing. All levels of writers are welcome; however, all students are expected to turn in typed work as opposed to handwritten.

HS Spanish I This course is an introduction to the Spanish language, including basic grammatical concepts, basic pronunciation, and conversation. Students will: learn greetings and leavings; ask and answer simple questions; use numbers in everyday contexts; give and follow directions; make purchases; narrate and describe events in present, past, and future tenses; express simple opinions; tell the gospel message; and learn and correctly use grammatical structures such as nouns, pronouns, adjectives, subject-verb agreement, gender and number agreement, regular and irregular verbs in the present and preterite tenses, the near future, reflexive verbs, direct and indirect object pronouns, and command forms.

HS Spanish II This course continues the study of Spanish including grammar, vocabulary, and other core concepts, verb conjugations, and speaking. The preterite/imperfect tenses, and the subjunctive mood are emphasized in second level grammar. Reading and translating become more complex and writing skills are honed.

HS Physical Science This is the required prerequisite class for further high school science; it should be taken in 9th grade. Text includes introductory chemistry, introductory physics, and the metric system in preparation for upper-level laboratory courses. There also will be lab activities. A prerequisite for this course is a working knowledge of basic algebraic principles or pre-algebra. Students may take Algebra 1 concurrently with this course.

HS Chemistry Chemistry students will discover amazing things about the properties of matter. The course groundwork is laid by discussing measurements and units, energy, heat, and temperature. We will then delve into the study of atoms and molecules, chemical equations, stoichiometry (the relationships that exist between quantities of substances in chemical reactions). The chemistry of acids and bases, the phases of matter, thermodynamics, kinetics, and chemical equilibrium will be explored. (We will cover oxidation-reductions reactions if there is time). There also will be lab activities with students in a lab group.

HS Physics From the book: This college-prep physics course is designed for the student who has completed algebra and has had an introduction to the definitions of sine, cosine, and tangent. It provides a detailed introduction to the methods and concepts of general physics, heavily emphasizing vector analysis; this text is ideal preparation for a university-level physics course. It provides the student with a strong background in one-dimensional and two-dimensional motion, Newton's laws and their application, gravity, work and energy, momentum, periodic motion, waves, optics, electrostatics, electrodynamics, electrical circuits, and magnetism.

HS Ancient History This one year class of Ancient and Biblical History covers Biblical history from creation through the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. It also covers ancient civilizations of the Fertile Crescent and Mediterranean Sea regions, including Mesopotamia, Egypt, Assyria, Babylon, Persia, Greece, Rome and more. Other ancient civilizations covered include China, India, Africa and the Americas. Geography will also be incorporated into this class.

HS Introduction to Economics (fall semester) The student will receive an introduction to Biblical teaching related to economics and the economic history of the United States. HS Public Speaking (spring semester) Young people do not need to be exemplary public speakers to do well in today's world. However, it is imperative that they be able to talk in front of more than one person at a time without panicking or freezing up. That is the purpose of this course. During the semester, we will focus on how to deliver talks, while not losing sight of the importance of the content of those talks. Topics to be covered may include: persuasion, opening/closing, use of voice, stage presence, and others.

This course covers another portion of the TED Talks book used in the spring 2018 public-speaking course. Students who took the spring 2018 course may call this course "Speech II" in their records. Please note that the spring 2018 course is **not** a prerequisite to this course. Any student at cornerstone is welcome to join – as long as they are at least in the ninth grade. New students should call this course "Speech I" or simply "Public Speaking."
