LAF Co-op classes, PreK-12th, will be held at Grace Fellowship Church in Shrewsbury on Thursdays from 9:00 a.m.-3:20 p.m.

Fall Session (10 weeks): Sept 19 to Nov 21 (Make-up: Dec 5)

High School (9th-12th Grade)

Composition - Write Shop II (8th- 12th Grades)

WriteShop II offers more challenging assignments such as descriptive narration, point of view, narrative voice, persuasion, and essays (including timed essays). With each lesson, they'll learn new skills, apply them to their current writing project, and edit and revise the composition several times. By the end of the lesson—after brainstorming, writing, editing, and revising—they'll have a polished paper to be proud of! This class is geared toward **8-12** grade students. It focuses on more advanced writing concepts.

Computer – App Development (8th- 12th Grades):

Have you ever thought, there should be an app for that? Have you had some experience with programming and curious what it would take to create an app for a mobile device from scratch? In this course, you'll learn how to create an Android project with Android Studio and run the app. You'll also learn some App architecture and the key principles underlying its design. You will gain an understanding of App development tools and user interface. By the end of the course, you'll build a simple app that you can share with your friends. (*Note that this course could be Apple App development but only if all students have Apple devices.)

Spanish I (7th- 12th Grades):

According to the Penn State University website, Spanish is the second most widely spoken language in

the world. With its origins in the Castille region of Northern Spain, it became a standardized language in the 13th century by King Alfonso of Spain. Currently, the Royal Spanish Academy (Real Academia Española), started in the 18th century, is the authoritative overseer of standard Spanish. Dictionaries and grammar produced by the academy are the standard that is currently used in Spain and Latin America. Being that it's a living language, variations in accent and dialect will vary in many Spanish speaking nations. However, the academic language remains the same, with minor differences in word choice.

This Spanish class will be based of Bob Jones University (BJU) Spanish I course. A quality biblically based curriculum with three levels that provide a solid foundation for higher learning. In this class, students will be learning to have a conversation focused on fluency and comprehension. We will be doing fun activities, such acting out dialogue in Spanish. Reading books and playing games that focus on reinforcing lessons learned from the book. Students will have access to DVDs to assist with homework.

Geography – Stanford's Geography (7th - 12th Grades):

Participate in map hunts, learn what it takes to be a cartographer, and gain insight into the interaction of climate, landform, and natural vegetation. As we travel through Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, and Russia this class will focus on two major themes. First the units act as an introduction to, or review of, fundamental geographical concepts and vocabulary. Second, they teach students about the basic physical and political geography of each region. I earned my BA in Geography with an emphasis in methods from SDSU and am a published author in Children's Geographies, an educational journal. I have a passion for studying and discussing how the world around us shapes us as individuals and societies.

Science - Biology (8th-12th Grades):

Students will explore life using Apologia's Exploring Creation with Biology (2nd ed). During this course students will study the sixteen modules in the book covering cells (structure and function), unicellular organisms, genetics, insects, plants, reptiles, mammals, and more. Students will participate in hands-on labs. There will be dissections (earthworm, grasshopper, crayfish, perch and frog) and labs with living organisms. Students will learn proper use of the microscope and slide preparation while having the opportunity to view live protozoa. Along with class discussions and labs the students will also participate in lab practicums and presentations. Student's will also receive links and videos that they can utilize during their home study to help solidify their understanding of the material being taught during class.

NOTE: This class spans across two periods. Students must take both the lecture and the lab, they are not separate entities. Please be sure you allot two class periods when planning your day to include this course.

Required supplies: 1/2" binder with 16 dividers and notebook paper, goggles, a pack of 10 pairs of dissecting gloves (any non-latex plastic glove sized to fit your student's hands), colored pencils, ruler, and calculator.

Science – Chemistry (9th-12th Grades)

Discovering Design with Chemistry is a high school chemistry course designed for students who have completed Algebra I. This college-preparatory course covers fundamental aspects of chemistry such as the classification of matter, atomic structure, spectroscopy, chemical bonding, molecular geometry, physical change, chemical change, stoichiometry, solutions, ideal gases, acid/base chemistry, reduction/oxidation reactions, thermochemistry, thermodynamics, kinetics, and chemical equilibrium. Weaving together concepts and their mathematical applications, the course teaches students how to think as a chemist so they can analyze the major changes that occur in matter. The course contains 46 separate experiments that illustrate various concepts being explored. Many are quantitative in nature, including measuring the wavelength of microwaves, determining the number of water molecules in a hydrated compound, calculating percent yield, measuring the concentration of a hydrogen peroxide solution, determining the concentration of acetic acid in vinegar, measuring the specific heat of a metal, and determining the change in enthalpy for a chemical reaction. Others are qualitative, such as performing flame tests, examining the interference of light waves, comparing metals to nonmetals, exploring Boyle's Law, doing litmus tests, and electroplating.

In WriteShop 1, assignments give students a chance to practice various kinds of writing, including creative, expository, narrative, and persuasive. With each lesson, they'll learn new skills, apply them to their current writing project, and edit and revise the composition several times. By the end of the lesson—after brainstorming, writing, editing, and revising—they'll have a polished paper to be proud of! This class is geared toward **6-10** grade students, and offers them a strong foundation in basic writing skills.

Dance (5th- 9th Grades):

If you have a child who loves to dance or would even just like to give dance a try then this class with our amazing Ms. Warkenda is the class for them. Her heart-felt philosophy is that everyone is a dancer, it is just that some people haven't realized it yet. The students will work within the art of several different dance music and movement to build strength, confidence, and a love of dance. An introduction into various dance history and vocabulary is also presented in each session. Students should come prepared to dance and have a water bottle with them. An end of the unit presentation will be presented by the students at the end of each session to show what they have learned.

Computer Skills (3rd - 12th Grades)

Keyboarding & Basic Skills (Fall Session) - This one session class will meet each student at their skill level. Students will spend half of every class period practicing proper Keyboarding skills. The second half of class would include time learning about using the Internet for research, how to download and insert images into documents, basic word processing skills. We will do an introduction to programming using an online tool called Scratch and learn how to integrate technology into your core class curriculum.

Website Design (Winter Session) - In this one session class students in grades 3-12 are invited to learn how to make their own webpage in a fun, safe, interactive way! Each student will be met at their skill level. We will start by learning some of the behind the scenes of web design and even learn how to do a little html coding. Students will learn about graphics and layouts and the importance of color on your web page. Through taking careful privacy measures, we will learn blog writing and how to properly interact online. By the end of class, each student will have their own website for whatever they choose.

Microsoft Office Skills (Spring Session) - This one session class will meet each student at their skill level. Does your child know how to create a book report, a graph or a newsletter, and a slide show on the computer? If not, this class would be a great way to prepare them for many projects they may have in High School and beyond. This class will go in-depth with how to use all the tools in Microsoft Word, Excel and Power Point. Middle and high-school students will learn how to adjust page layouts, margins, font size and spacing as we learn how to create a works cited page in MLA format. For younger students, we will practice by creating a fun newsletter for our co-op and explore using columns, text boxes and images. Class projects will be geared towards your child's age as they become tech-savvy individuals!

Drama – Improvisational Theater (9th- 12th Grades):

This is a year-long course developing improvisational theatre ensemble skills - the performance art of theater made up completely on the spot! Students will form an improvisational "troupe" which will have at least one - if not more - opportunities to perform throughout the year. Students will learn the basics of improv such as staying in the moment, character work, scene work, improvisational games and, most importantly, teamwork. No prior experience is necessary, but Mary will teach advanced concepts in improvisational performance. Homework may include watching video of improvisational performers and the class may take a field trip to Baltimore to view a performance of the world-renown Baltimore Improv Group. *The class requires parental approval for viewing of these performances, as content can never be guaranteed. Participation in this part of the class is **not** mandatory.*

History – American (8th- 12th Grades):

American history isn't a history of good vs. evil, but a richly nuanced texture interwoven with the fascinating, interesting lives of thousands of people. Students will explore historic events, the atmosphere surrounding them, and their impact on the country's future. We will use portions of documentaries, readings, and even movies to explore American history from 1600 – the end of Reconstruction. I hope the students will gain knowledge and a love of American history through lively

discussions and interesting activities.

History - Contemporary World (7th- 12th Grades):

Slog, slog, slog. We have made it through the Civil War and reconstruction. It is late April, and we have one more month of school to cover all of World War I, World War II, the Cold War, and present day. We better sprint through all of it really quickly. Does this sound familiar to anyone? This class begins around the turn of the 20th century. No longer is the time after reconstruction merely a time to be sped through, we will take time to understand the importance and implication of these events. How did the Bolshevik revolution impact the Cold War? What is MAD? When did the Cold War end? What was the Arab Spring? Why was the US involved in Afghanistan? How did there come to be Sudan and South Sudan? What is the deal with the Koreas, and how could they march under the same Olympic flag from 2000-2006? While this course is geared toward high school students, I welcome 7 and 8 grade students as well. Students in grades 7 and 8 will have slightly lower level expectations. We will use portions of documentaries such as The Civil War by Ken Burns and podcasts such as Backstory.

Literature - Great Books (9th- 12th Grades)

What is a Great Book? How does a book even get to be in a category where the very term “Great Books” is capitalized? How can reading and discussing the so called Great Books possibly help students in the practical matters of their life? Why would homeschool parents force their high school students to read these “tedious” works of literature? All these questions and more will be answered in our year of reading and discussing together a few of the Great Books from the ancient time period (Creation-400 AD). This class will employ the Socratic Method, which is to say that the success of the class will rely heavily on the students being prepared for class ahead of time and being ready to discuss (out loud) what we are all reading together. Students will learn to identify themes and worldviews throughout literature. They will analyze and synthesize ideas and arguments. They will learn that ideas matter because ideas have consequences. They will become more active learners. If the class is completed as outlined in the syllabus, they will earn a full high school credit in Literature.

This class assumes that “All truth is God’s truth”, and that His truth may be found in all of His creation, including in the area of literature. The Word of God is relevant to history, literature and to our life. The student will grapple with his own worldview and will begin to understand that he needs to “own” his/her own worldview as a mature adult. Believe it or not, a study of the Great Books is a very useful tool in moving toward this goal!

Note: We will read and discuss about 7-8 Great Books over the course of the year. The list will include such works as Genesis, The Odyssey, The Epic of Gilgamesh, Plato’s Republic and others (subject to change). A full reading list including the exact editions required for class will be available to registered students by June 1, so that purchases may be made over the summer.

Math Support - Algebra I, Algebra 2 and Geometry (8th - 12th Grades)

This class will involve math assistance for Algebra I, Algebra 2 and Geometry. I will provide help with topics that students are having difficulty with, as well as covering new topics. I will assess areas of weakness for each student and work to improve those areas as the students continue in their own math curriculums. In class, I will work with students in whatever curriculum is being used at home, either one on one or in groups. This is a great opportunity to provide your student with the extra help that he/she may need to succeed in the "higher math" subjects. There is no materials fee or textbook required, other than the math textbook being used at home.

NOTE : This is a 1 period class but a student may sign up for BOTH the 12:30 and 1:30 period if they would like additional help.

Biblical Overview (9th- 12th Grades):

People have used it, abused it, and have been changed by it. Wars have been fought over it, churches have been split over it. This one book has changed the course of human events and has impacted multiple societies. It has impacted countless individuals, and changed the hearts of millions. Over the course of the year, we will cover Genesis through Revelation and unpack the incredible message God gave to each of us. We will be covering basic theology as well as going to the Bible Museum at the

end of the year. Students will be expected to share at least one reflection throughout the year.

Current Events (6th- 12th Grades):

A discussion based class focusing on the current events in the USA and the world. We will discuss a variety of topics in the news including politics, sports, medicine and education. Students will be asked to watch the news and or read current news articles and columns. Students will be encouraged to defend their opinions and views on the topic under discussion. We will discuss some the events from a Scriptural perspective. All students will be expected to participate in the discussions.

Economics (8th- 10th Grades):

The award-winning illustrator Grady Klein has paired up with the world's only stand-up economist, Yoram Bauman, PhD, to take the dismal out of the dismal science. From the optimizing individual to game theory to price theory, *The Cartoon Introduction to Economics* is the most digestible, explicable, and humorous economics you'll ever read. Bauman has put the "comedy" into "economy" at comedy clubs and universities around the country and around the world (his "Principles of Economics, Translated" is a YouTube cult classic). As an educator at both the university and high school levels, he has learned how to make economics relevant to today's world and today's students. As Google's chief economist, Hal Varian, wrote, "You don't need a brand-new economics.
