The summer season officially starts on Memorial Day. Some of us are finished with school, some are not. Some do school year-round and will only be taking a break. This is the time for making memories. I've been asked to share some ideas for summer activities – mostly educational, somewhat educational, and mostly fun, not so educational. On the mostly educational side, summer is a time for history and science with some English thrown in if you encourage your children to journal their activities. On the history side- North Dakota has fifty-seven historic sites, scattered throughout the state. Take some day trips and check out those near you. In my study of North Dakota history, one summer my kids and I



(hubby came along when he could), visited all but four of those sites. We learned a lot - did a lot of driving and saw some spectacular scenes throughout our lovely state. Almost every county has a museum - some are bigger than others, but all contain some great stories. Take Grandma and Grandpa along and let them share their memories of using that old wringer washer, wood burning cook stove, and hand pump for water! An historical must is the North Dakota Heritage Center! If you say, "Oh, but we went there last summer." You're still missing things. They are regularly adding to exhibits, bringing in traveling exhibits and changing exhibits. Every time I go, I see something new. Other historic sites are Ft. Union, the Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center, the Knife River Indian Village and the Theodore Roosevelt National Park [Editor: Ft. Totten has original military post era buildings and is worth the trip; catch some fishing in Devils Lake while you are at it!1.

























The field of science picks up at the national park where history drops off. Study biology – plant and animal life, geology, and astronomy. The park is full of prairie dogs, bison, elk, bighorn sheep, with horses, antelope, eagles, and more. Take a hike on some of the marked foot trails. Be sure to take along a guidebook and locate the native flora. If you live too far from the national park, visit one of North Dakota's thirteen state parks or sixty-three wildlife refuges. You'll see a plethora of local fauna and flora. Invest in some guidebooks: North Dakota animals, birds, and plants. These are treasures of knowledge and fun as you identity what you observe. North Dakota also has ten scenic by-ways and back-ways. Find one near you and drive it! Don't forget those guidebooks and the camera! When you're studying animals don't forget Minot, Bismarck and Fargo have zoos. [Editor: And Wahpeton has a fabulous zoo!]

For lessons in geology - learn about the stratiated buttes, concretions, petrified trees and fossils. Or try your hand at some astronomy state and national parks are great for star gazing as they are a distance from light pollution. This year watch the night sky from July 17 to August 24 when the Perseids meteor shower passes through or bring star maps and find the constellations.

So, now for the somewhat educational. I would include organized sports (baseball, football, basketball, track, tennis, golf, bowling) in this category because they all require the use of mathematics- keeping score- to some degree, and of course, sports are physical education! Three of North Dakota's golf courses have been ranked in the top one hundred courses in the country. Concerts in the park also fall into this category. Summer isn't complete without some of these activities: camping, hiking, biking, boating, fishing, and swimming! I'm sure there's math, science, history and other subjects in there somewhere.

What about the mostly fun – not so educational stuff? At the top of my list is a fair. It doesn't have to be the State Fair, although that's spectacular, most counties have a fair of some sort. Check out the barns and see animals, crafts, quilts, foods, etc! Think about exhibiting something, you never know when you might be a blue-ribbon winner. Right behind a fair and maybe tied with it, is a Fourth of July parade and fireworks. If you've never experienced Fourth of July at the state capitol, plan on doing it someday. But get there early - to get a good seat. When we go, we go for the whole day! We take a picnic lunch and dinner, lawn games, board games, balls and Frisbees. We pick our spots, put down blankets and spend the day. The Heritage Center is open and in the evening the Bismarck/Mandan symphony plays a concert, guest speakers present, usually there is a jet fly over and finally a spectacular fireworks display above the capitol build-

Whatever you plan for this summer, whether educational, some-what educational, or just plain fun – make some memories with your
